

Parliamentarians' Capacity Building Project on Accountability and Aid Implementation for Population and Development Issues









Introduction

There is a pressing need for further efforts in the field of population in order to tackle crucial global issues; however, due to the gap between donor commitments and actual ODA flow, these issues are still lagging behind. For example, the MDG5 target to reduce the MMR by three-fourths between 1990 and 2015 is not considered feasible, seeing that the average MMR per 100,000 live births in developing countries was 480 in 1990; 450 in 2005; and must still be brought down to 120 by 2015. Similarly, the MDG4 target to reduce the under-five mortality rate by two-thirds between 1990 and 2015 is behind schedule; although the average of 103 per 1000 births in developing countries in 1990 decreased to 74 in 2007, the objective is 34 by 2015.

While ODA is indispensable to tackle these issues, people in developed countries are not always supportive because they are facing their own popula-

tion issues such as Dr. Kiyoko aging, declining Ikegami; birthrate, and inse-Hon. Jenista Joakim curity in the pension Mhagama, MP; and social security Ms. Kitolina systems. NGOs and Kippa other stakeholders are appealing to



increase ODA, especially to parliamentarians who legislate and approve budget.

Globalisation has come to mean that the challenges facing developing countries have repercussions on developed countries. In order for individuals to continue to lead a dignified life on this finite earth, both developed and developing countries have to exert efforts to fulfil their shared responsibility. In order to expand ODA, public understanding and support is a must, thus transparency and accountability need to be improved with emphases on the following:

- People understand the significance of population issues
- People understand the importance of ODA
- People are informed of ODA implementation
- People are informed of good practices and lessons learned from ODA projects
- Developed countries are informed of people's needs in developing countries
- Programmes are planned and developed according to these needs

Project Objectives & Significance of Parliamentarians' Involvement

Population issues are closely related to ways of life, values and cultures which neither governments nor politicians can force upon society; therefore, public involvement in this issue is vital. Solving population issues also requires, along with social and economic development, certain conditions through adequate legislation and budget allocations - this is where parliamentarians play a key role. As elected representatives, parliamentarians are attuned to constituents' needs and are catalysts for public understanding.

and efficient by strengthening the parliamentary network on population and development and equipping parliamentarians with necessary information and tools. Every world region now has a parliamentarian forum on population and development. In Asian and African regions, under the catchall of AFPPD and FAAPPD respectively, all-party national parliamentary committees are working hard to address these issues.

Involvement of these national committees in the ODA process will contribute to improving ODA transparency and accountability, as well as good governance in respective countries. Enhancing the role and capacity of parliamentarians will serve to meet the requirements from donor countries and people's needs in developing countries.



In sum, the objectives of this 3-year project are to identify the issues regarding ODA; improve transparency and accountability Hon. Dr. through engaging parliamentarians Nguyen Van and their national committees on population and development in the ODA processes; inform the

general public of the effectiveness of ODA in developing and developed countries through the partnership between the two; and lay the foundation to realise ODA by the people, for the people.







Outline of Workshop Visits (7-8 July 2009)

The workshop opened on 7 July in the Members' Building of the House of Representatives with an address by Ms. Kayoko Shimizu, APDA Vice-Chair. In the introductory session, Dr. Osamu Kusumoto, APDA Secretary-General/ Executive Director, presented the project framework and scope, which was followed by free discussion on the topic. A welcome lunch was hosted by Hon. Mayumi Moriyama, Vice-Chair of JPFP, and the ensuing tour of parliament was arranged by the office of Hon. Yasuo Fukuda, Chair of APDA/JPFP/AFPPD.

The delegation later visited MOFA where Mr. Akira Yamada, Deputy Director-General of the International Cooperation Bureau, gave detailed information on Japan's ODA history, achievements and principles; and also regarding follow-up actions from TICAD IV and G8 Summit commitments. Hon. Nobuhide Minorikawa, Parliamentary Vice-Minister for Foreign Affairs, explained that the Government of Japan places a high priority on population and health issues; the importance of which is recognised through the policy on human security.

On 8 July, the programme commenced with a visit to Roppongi Hills where the participants were received by Mr. Yoshio Karita, Senior Advisor of Mori Building Co., Ltd., and member of the APDA Board of Councillors. They were briefed on the Tokyo Re-development Plan that has been taking place in the area which is maximising a minimum amount of space in the megacity.

After enjoying international cuisine at the JICA Global Plaza Café, Prof. Takahisa Kusano, Director-General



of JICA Global Plaza, informed participants of the JICA programmes which focus on community participation. Upon arrival at JICA Headquarters delegates were given a comprehensive

presentation on "New JICA" by Mr. Yoshihisa Ueda, Vice-President of JICA, and then engaged in active discussions with JICA experts.

Outline of Workshop Meeting (9-10 July 2009)

The second component of the workshop was held at the United Nations University in cooperation with UNFPA Tokyo Office. The opening address was given by Hon. Chieko Nohno, JPFP Secretary-General, followed by

the Director-General of the International Cooperation Bureau of MOFA, Mr. Masato Kitera, and Dr. Kiyoko Ikegami, Director of the UNFPA Tokyo Office. The attendance of two out of the three female former Ministers of Justice in the

history of the Japanese government, Hon. Mayumi Moriyama and Hon. Chieko Nohno, magnified the spirit of the project.

the fullest with the attendees whom on the second day conducted break-away discussions, identified issues, and formulated recommendations to be transmuted during this 3-year project. At the end of the meeting the Secretariat requested the participants' continued involvement through the web forum and follow-up activities. In the

closing ceremony, Hon. Chieko Nohno and Hon. Wakako Hironaka, member of the APDA Board of Directors/JPFP Senior Vice-Chair, expressed their gratitude to the attendees for their active participation and parted in the hope of meeting again next year.

Towards 2010

This project aims to implement specific measures, including legislation, to enhance ODA's effectiveness and efficiency through improved accountability and transparency; thus post-workshop activities in respective countries are significant to devise the 2010 programme. IAPPD has held a follow-up meeting with parliamentarians, advocating this project and Japan's ODA by inviting a former Ambassador of Japan to India as a guest speaker. The Hon. Member of Parliament from Cambodia informed APDA that the workshop report was submitted to the Chair of CAPPD and shared with fellow parliamentarians.

Identifying the Issues

1. In Governments:

In general, governments do not provide adequate information on planning, design, implementation, focus, assessment, governance, and expected and actual outcomes of ODA; specifically, governments need to provide adequate information on ODA for population and development regarding amount, outcomes, processes, governance of ODA, challenges, and also ODA integration with population and development.

2. In Regional Parliamentarians' Fora on Population and Development:

- 2.1 There is no centralised regional database accessible to parliamentarians of ODA or otherwise
- 2.2 Some countries have yet to establish a Parliamentarians' National Committee on Population and Development
- 2.3 The capacity of some Parliamentarians' National Committees is not sufficient enough
- 2.4 There is no general existing mechanism for developed countries to exchange information about the needs and difficulties the developing countries face

3. In Parliaments of Recipient Countries:

In some instances, parliaments have not taken proper action and measures for creating an accountability and transparency framework of the ODA recipient process and its conditions, i.e.:

- 3.1 Absence in some countries of a Parliamentarians' National Committee on Population and Development
- 3.2 Some Parliamentarians' National Committees' Secretariat do not have enough capacity for research and policymaking
- 3.3 Insufficient legislation ensuring transparency and accountability for ODA implementation
- 3.4 Some countries do not have an integrated population/health policy and legislation within the realm of sustainable development
- 3.5 Some countries lack development policies and related legislation in the context of population and sustainable development
- 3.6 There are inadequate mechanisms to monitor and evaluate ODA processes and progress

4. In Parliaments of Donor Countries:

- 4.1 Some parliaments do not sufficiently examine the ODA donor process in their own countries
- 4.2 There are no institutional frameworks between parliamentarians of donor and recipient countries to exchange information on ODA
- 4.3 There are inadequate mechanisms for monitoring and evaluation of ODA
- 4.4 Some parliamentarians do not have adequate information to be able to appreciate the rationale for ODA









Recommendations and Priority Issues

1. Request to Governments:

- 1.1 Governments should provide parliamentarians with adequate and timely information on all aspects of ODA programmes
- 1.2 National Parliamentary Committees on Population and Development should request the government to place a higher priority on population issues when formulating and requesting ODA

2. Requests to Regional Parliamentarians Fora on Population and Development:

- 2.1 To compile and share good practices of ODA implementation within the Regional Forum
- 2.2 Facilitate the establishment of a National Committee of Parliamentarians on Population and Development in countries that do not yet have such a committee
- 2.3 Promote exchange on ODA issues between parliamentarians within the regions, and also link parliamentarians from beneficiary countries with parliamentarians from donor countries

3. Request to the Parliaments of Recipient Countries:

- 3.1 Legislate to make government responsible and accountable for ODA
- 3.2 Examine indices to monitor/evaluate the ODA progress
- 3.3 Establish a National Committee on Population and Development, if there is not one yet and provide sufficient capacity for policymaking
- 3.4 Re-examine and develop comprehensive population, health, and development related policies and enact relevant legislation within the context of sustainable development

4. Request to the Parliaments of Donor Countries:

- 4.1 Take a keen interest in international development and monitor the ODA process
- 4.2 Cooperate with counterparts in recipient countries to make ODA programmes more effective
- 4.3 Set up mechanisms to properly measure the ODA outcomes
